Academic English Support: Semester 1, 2013-14

The Centre for English Language Education provides a programme of language support and insessional academic English courses for students at the University of Nottingham Malaysia Campus. This semester the programme includes speaking, reading, writing and grammar, as well as individual consultation sessions and self-access facilities. All insessional courses, language consultations and the self-access facilities are provided free-of-charge.

Insessional Courses

This semester Insessional courses will be offered to help you with academic English and study skills needed for your academic courses. The classes are taught in modules that take place at various times during the week. The duration of each class session ranges from 1.5 to 2 hours. In addition, a 6-hour writing class for postgraduate students is also planned.

Registration for insessional courses will take place on Moodle. Please note that you will have to self-register for the module.

Advanced Writing Course for Postgraduate Arts and Social Sciences Students

Are you a postgraduate student? Are you concerned about your coursework assignments? This short course will focus on the writing longer discursive projects and essays. It will encourage students to notice the features of academic writing and organisation needed to best express their thesis. This course will be quite theoretical, and will focus on the generic features expected in an essay. It is suitable for postgraduate students in the faculty who need to write long, analytical essays.

Academic Reading

Do you find yourself spending a lot of time staring at a single paragraph or page of your textbook and not really understanding the content although you do know most of the words? Or are you taking too long going through your reading materials that you have to rush with your assignments? This module will introduce you to reading strategies that can help you get the big picture of the text and understand the ideas quicker.

Academic Presentation Skills

Do you have to presentations for some of your modules? Are you nervous about speaking in front of a class? This course teaches you how to plan a presentation, speak confidently and effectively, and develop effective PowerPoint presentation slides.

Discussion Skills

Are you unsure of how to participate meaningfully in discussions and engage with your peers during tutorial sessions? Being able to explore ideas and express oneself clearly, diplomatically and without obstruction are a few of the skills students will be exposed to in this course.

Grammar

Do you desire to improve your writing ability and produce error-free essays? This module is designed for students who desire to enhance the accuracy and clarity of their writing. Topics that will be covered include Tenses, Number and Agreement, Fixing Sentence-Level Problems, Comma Splices, etc.

Intercultural Awareness

Have you ever faced a situation when someone from another culture has behaved in a way that you just didn't understand or expect? This might well be because they have different ways of seeing the world and what is normal for them is not normal for you. This short course will allow the participants to explore the underlying values and assumptions that go towards making up a culture, enabling the participants to interact more fruitfully within a multi-national and multi-cultural campus

Referencing, Citation and Avoiding Plagiarism

Are you unsure of how to document your sources using proper, academic conventions? This course refines students' ability to substantiate their academic essays through the use of proper citation and referencing strategies. Skills covered in this course also include quoting, paraphrasing, and the use of discernment in choosing secondary sources.

Report Writing

Do you have to write reports for your classes, and are not entirely sure how to tackle report writing assignments? This course aims to improve and hone the skills students need in order that they are able to write effective reports.

Language Consultations

CELE tutors provide free one-to-one consultations to students. Each consultation session is for 30 minutes. Students may email a tutor for an appointment. Each student is limited to 5 consultation sessions per semester.

There is a limit of 1000 words per session, and students should send their written work to the tutor 48 hours before the appointment.
