Study 1

Technology Enhanced Language Learning in Malaysia – An International School's Perspective Ngee Fui Cheong (Studying towards a Masters in TESOL, UNMC)

This case study investigated technology enhanced language learning (TELL) in an international school in Malaysia. Today's students are digital natives who can process multiple streams of information. The study's aims are to evaluate an English teacher's classroom TELL practices and the school's teacher support system for successful TELL implementation. TELL offers more opportunities for interactive learning and continuous learning beyond the classroom. Teacher preparedness and peer support are integral in ensuring successful TELL implementation.

Do I get what I bargain for in a flipped classroom?

Flipped learning is the recommended instruction model at the tertiary level because it frees up time from lecturing and engage students in active learning by integration of technology. In this presentation, I shall share my experience in flipping one of my modules using Office Mix. I will focus on students' feedback on flipped learning and my reflection on the practice.
