Abstract

In increasingly diverse learning environments, teachers more often than not have a challenging time understanding how to effectively engage students of different cultures and backgrounds. One of the aspects this presentation will explore is using intercultural awareness to spark student engagement, through self-discovery in a classroom free of perceived boundaries.

Developing a Taxonomic Framework: Design and Methodological Considerations

Abstract

In researching the role of higher education in developing creativity in graduates, I have found a wide range of issues of concern particularly expressed by employers. The bottom line is the mismatch between graduate and market demands. This has seen an emphasis on the development of skills supporting the creation of knowledge and innovation. Creativity in education has now become an international concern that has led to a greater emphasis of promoting and rewarding the creativity of teachers and learners. A gap in the effort to promote criticality and creativity is the lack or absence of a systematic framework that may be used to support the incorporation of creativity in teaching and learning similar to the role played by the Bloom's taxonomy with reference to learning. My research explores the possibility of developing such a taxonomic framework for creativity that may be used for teaching and learning and assessment. It uses a multiphase mixed-methods design to develop a taxonomic framework. This session will highlight the different phases that will be undertaken by this study in building the prototype taxonomic framework for creativity. It will also discuss the difference in mixed method models for data collection and justify why I have chosen an advanced mixed methods, multiphase model.
