The University of Nottingham 2+2 MPharm programme delivered at the Malaysia Campus was the FIRST Pharmacy degree offered in Malaysia to be accredited by the Royal Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain (now the General Pharmaceutical Council - GPhC). The new MPharm 2012 was successfully accredited in the Malaysia Campus in May 2012 by GPhC, and subsequently re-accredited recently in May 2018 by the same body. This means that students who have successfully completed their MPharm course and pre-registration training year will be able to register as pharmacists within the UK. The MPharm course is also acknowledged and registrable with the Malaysian Pharmacy Board.

Checklist for registration

The following checklist will help you prepare for the start of the new semester at Nottingham:

Final transcript

Please email (Roshanini.Idrus@nottingham.edu. my) a copy of your final A-level results and/or IELTS results (if applicable). Kindly upload your results through the Admissions portal as well. If you do not quite make the offer please contact us too. We may have places available and you may still be considered.

Certificate of Good Conduct

When you register we will ask you to submit documents which show evidence of good conduct and character (applicable to both Malaysians and international students). For Malaysian citizens this will be a Certificate of Good Conduct from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Log onto www.kln.gov.my, go to 'Application of Certificate of Good Conduct' to get more information. You can still register without this certificate but you will need to obtain one during the first few weeks of term.

Health Questionnaires

We have also sent a health questionnaire to you via email, and this questionnaire should be submitted at the time of registration.

Hepatitis B immunization

Upon registration, you will be asked to provide proof of Hepatitis B immunization to fulfil the requirement stipulated by the Ministry of Health for all students (locals and foreigners) undergoing placements and visits to General Hospitals in Malaysia. If you are unable to undergo Hepatitis B immunization due to medical/other reasons, please let us know.

Registration/Induction Week

Do take note that the Registration/Induction Week for year 2018/19 will start from 18th till 22nd September. Approaching September, you will be able to get more information about Registration/Induction Week from Admissions Office as well as from our university website. During this week, you will be given a brief introduction to the School of Pharmacy and the facilities available on campus such as the library, accommodation quarters and laboratories. You will also be given the semester timetable and have the opportunity to know your tutors, lecturers and seniors during this exciting week.

Kong Shin Wei, MPharm Year 4


Shin Wei has secured a pre-registration placement in Sherwood Forest Hospitals NHS Trust, Nottingham UK.

In the final year, School of Pharmacy did a great job in designing and allocating modules such as the Pharmacy and Leadership Management and the Integrated Pharmaceutical and Patient Care modules. The final year syllabus provides us with an opportunity to apply the skills and clinical knowledge learnt from the past three years. The holistic teaching of these modules prepare us in developing the responsibilities and accountability as pharmacists in the future. There are lots of commitment in our final years - we worked in groups in most of the modules and such group interactions include peer teaching, drug discovery and pharmacy simulation games. 

As an international student from Hong Kong, enrolling myself onto the MPharm course at UNM has given me excellent academic and experiential exposure. Being able to complete the course in two very diverse countries has not only prepared me to take on the role as a pre-reg trainee with the United Lincolnshire Hospital NHS Trusts, but has also shaped me as a well-rounded, open-minded individual.

The shift from Malaysia to the UK was extremely exciting for our entire cohort. We were all nervous, yet enthusiastic to continue tackling the challenges of the course, in a completely different cultural setting, much further away from the warmth of the equator. Alongside the geographical change, the practice of the pharmacy in UK was also of great interest to us.

Eric Tee Wei Seong, class of 2016


Eric is currently working at an independent chain community pharmacy at Coventry, UK.

Although only mainly medical doctors undertake this postgraduate fellowship program, my UoN MPharm degree enabled me to learn alongside senior medical doctors the newest healthcare information from Dr Sreekumar, Senior Consultant in ENT & Head and Neck Surgeon with more than 34 years of clinical practice and has been actively practicing Nutritional, Environmental & Cellular Medicine since 2001.

The UoN MPharm undergraduate degree has prepared me well, I felt at ease working alongside other healthcare professionals during my pre-registration year and as a hospital clinical pharmacist, managing patients' medications and contributing to patients' healthcare plan. The MPharm undergraduate degree also empowered me with the necessary knowledge, skills and tools in order to successfully complete the postgraduate FINEM course.

Some advice for my juniors; go that extra mile, put yourself out there, do everything within your power and capabilities to raise your standards, create network and meet new people, and get involved in a society, summer placement, part-time work or pick up a unique hobby. Learn from your mistakes and experiences, in my first two years at Nottingham Malaysia, I failed to become a PharmNotts committee member as I lacked public speaking skills during elections.
